SPRING NEWS SHEET, 1970

Locomotives Members may know that since 171 was put back into service last year we have been relying on a borrowed lubricator from No 74 "Dunluce Castle" in the Transport Museum. The period of loan was extended several times owing to difficulty in obtaining a replacement. Eventually after prolonged searching we obtained one from the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway in exchange for a vacuum ejector, needed to equip a saddle tank for passenger work. The exchange was effected during a visit to Keighley by three members in December.

Our thanks go to Mr Thomson of the Ulster Folk Museum for his understanding help and officials of the K&WVR.

In preparation for their annual boiler inspection all wash-out plugs, inspection doors, dome covers, safety valves and boiler cleading have been removed and the boilers washed out. The preliminary report of the boiler inspector has been favourable.

Work has been progressing on removing the taper, ovality and scratches from 186's left driving crankpin. This has been undertaken voluntarily by Raymond Hall and Jimmy Moffat of Harland & Wolff.

The Loco Officer wishes to record his thanks to all those who have toiled long hours, working in wet pits, cleaning sooty smokeboxes, removing clinker from fireboxes and wrestling with stiff wash-out plugs. In particular John Lockett, Robin Morton, Derek Henderson, Joe Cassells, Bob Edwards and Larry Crawford deserve special mention.

Annual General Meeting After the usual reports R.C. Edwards made, and P. Newell seconded, a proposal to hold future AGMs in November. This is devised to enable the newly-elected Railtour Sub-Committee to complete their plans and negotiations timely for publication in the cross-Channel enthusiasts' magazines. Hitherto the officer and sub-committee responsible for this, the most important part of the Society's activities, both financially and railwaywise, have had to follow plans laid down by their predecessors. This challenging work, packed tight with valuable unpublished information, will receive a detailed review in the next issue of Five Foot Three.

The latest edition of "Steam Alive" (Ian Allan) contains much well-written material, chiefly on RPSI Railtours. You can help the Society's funds by ordering your copy from the Treasurer (see list of officers). An excellent colour photo of 171 by John Stuart graced the cover of the mid-January issue of "Model Engineer".

Site The resleeping of the shed turnout mentioned in the Autumn News Sheet has now been completed. The job was a difficult one as the old chairs used meant that the crossing timbers had to be drilled afresh to accept the coach bolts.

A water pump has been obtained from the GPO together with a supply of 2" collapsible delivery pipe and suction pipe; during experiments a straight lift of 21 feet was achieved. The equipment will be used on Railtours where a proper supply is not available or in working order.

The Open Day this year will be on Saturday, 27th June. Members are asked to come down to the site both before and on the day itself; there is quite a lot to be done beforehand while on the day there will be things like car parking, crowd control and, of course, the gate to be attended to. Volunteers, or anyone with ideas for money-raising at Open Day, are asked to contact the Site Officer (see list of officers) or any member of the sub-committee, Sullivan Boomer, John Richardson or Tony Ragg or just come down to Whitehead on any Saturday afternoon - it's still only 3s 6d return by rail on production of a current membership card. Attractions already "booked" include two of our engines in steam hauling passengers, Macha Film Studios' film show of past RPSI Railtours, a working O gauge model railway with dozens of nostalgic Irish types at work and Lord O'Neill's veteran and vintage cars while "hopefuls" include traction engines and a Super Sentinel steam lorry, an exhibition line from the Ulster Model Railway Society in 4mm scale and a passenger carrying model railway worked by the freelance steam loco "Midge".

Dublin Area Macha Film Studios will present their 1970 Irish steam film show in the IRRS-áras, Drumcondra, Dublin on Friday 6th March at 8 pm. The programme will include film of the Brian Boru Railtour and a look at some past Jeep workings, including "Up Tourist Train" and "Port to Port".
