ENCORE, ENCORE: Our veteran 4-4-0 No.171 "Slieve Gullion" played her part perfectly in the filming at Carrickfergus on Sunday March 20 for the BBC drama production "Aunt Suzanne". The play, by Stewart Parker, is due to be screened nationwide in the autumn. For the day, Carrick station played the role of Richhill station on the Portadown-Armagh line, and the filming also involved a number of false starts from Whitehead earlier in the day.

The three RPSI extras should also feature in the finished product. Johnny Glendinning, Ken Pullin and Tommy Dorrian all had their hair shorn and donned porters' uniforms for their star roles. 171 was making her first public appearance with her new chimney - but we bet you won't spot any difference. And the day was also notable for the first appearance outside the site of two of our renovated carriages - NCC North Atlantic 91 and GS&WR all 1st 1142. While both coaches still require a lot of internal work, they have been re-roofed, had rotten panels and woodwork replaced, and have been professionally lined out and lettered. Hopefully they will be in traffic for the RPSI later this year.

* Unfortunately the day's filming at Carrick was marred by the death late in the afternoon of Mr Jim McAllister, who collapsed and died on the platform while taking part in the filming. Mr McAllister was a member of Carrick pigeon club whose job was to release pigeons across the platform as 171 pulled in. Needless to say, filming was cancelled for the day afterwards.

NIACRO NEWS: The start of the Northern Ireland Association for the Care and Resettlement of Offenders scheme at Whitehead should now be only a matter of weeks away. RPSI member Frank Gallagher, who had been a member of our ACE (Action for Community Employment) team at Whitehead, has been appointed to the post of senior supervisor for the project. Other supervisors will be recruited, and the first of the 22-strong group of unemployed teenagers should start arriving after that. The wage bill is met by the authorities, and the Society provides materials for the programme of carriage renovation. The NIACRO work will take place in its own shed within the RPSI site, and we have been granted permission by Carrickfergus Borough Council to make a sub-lease with NIACRO.

DOWN LINE: Members may have read in the press recently about moves by Down District Council to explore the possibility of re-opening the Downpatrick -Ardglass B&CDR branch line. At present the B&CDR Museum Trust is considering whether to support this project instead of its original plan for the Ballynahinch branch. The RPSI was invited to a meeting recently with Down District Council and has agreed that it should, without prejudice, take up the invitation to send a representative to sit on the steering committee to keep a watching brief. Meanwhile a further meeting has been held with representatives of Banbridge District Council over the possibility of establishing a pilot scheme at Laurencetown for the Banbridge Junction Railway.
