PACKING A PUNCH: Enclosed with this circular you will find (if you live in Northern Ireland) a couple of posters publicising the Santa Claus steam train rides at Whitehead. Please do your bit by asking your local shop or garage to put one of the posters in their window, or else have one displayed at school or work. Just to recap, the Santa train rides will be in operation at Whitehead on the following dates:

Saturday December 3

Sundays November 27, December 4, 11 and 18.

13.30 to 16.30.

Fares: £1.25 children, 75p adults. Complimentary glass of seasonal punch for the adults, present for the children, steam train ride for all the family.

The Santa trains are now one of the biggest events in the Society's calendar so tell your friends and take a tip - don't leave it to the last minute if you want to avoid the crowds. Locomotive-wise our Whitehead workforce is busy getting our 2-6-4T No.4 back in operation in time for the Santa trains. 4's driving crank pins have been turned by Harland & Wolff, the big ends given some attention, and now the engine is being reassembled and tested. As recorded in the last news-sheet, 4 came to grief on the September 3 Steam Enterprise, and now the long and tedious process of running in is starting all over again. There's also a chance, by the way, that 4 may put in a week on the NIR Larne line ballast train in the New Year as part of the running-in. Follow that, SLOA!

BUS-SHED FIRE: Local members will have heard through the media of the fire which destroyed the bus shed at Whitehead early on October 1. The bus shed, which was outside the RPSI compound, was owned by Carrickfergus Borough Council, but the RPSI had commandeered about three-quarters of the premises for storage purposes. Pending the signing of a lease the Society had not taken out insurance cover on the materials stored there. We should stress that the fire was not believed to have been started maliciously. Forensic experts thought an electrical fault may have been to blame. The most serious loss was the destruction of carriage spares - a total of 20 doors and five sets of batteries were burnt. Two spare lorry cabs owned by the Society were burnt out, and a bus owned by a member was engulfed in the flames. Two narrow gauge diesel locos being stored by the Society for the DoE Conservation Branch suffered scorch damage. Loco spares such as boiler tubes and superheater elements survived the fire. Now the shed has been pulled down and the site cleared, leaving us with something of a storage problem within the RPSI site.

DUBLIN BAY - PHEW! Phew, what a crowd was what they were saying on the Dublin-Bray shuttle on September 24. The venture was a phenomenal success and hearty congratulations to all concerned. Space on the train was at a premium because coach 861 had to be taken off the train after receiving a red ticket from CIÉ for a suspect gangway end (not, as one Sunday paper had it, metal fatigue). Workshop coach 114 was hurriedly substituted, but it has only 21 seats compared with 861's complement of 56. However, all the passengers thoroughly enjoyed their taste of steam under the wires

and it's a venture we might repeat in April 1984 if the full electric service is delayed.

MILLIONAIRES' CLUB: Many thanks to all those members who helped sell ballot tickets for the Society's Autumn Draw on October 22.
