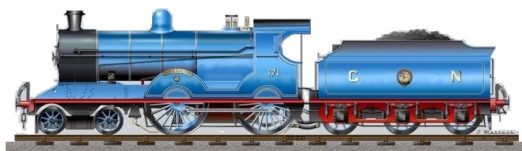

LOCKDOWN TIMETABLE

29th January: General Manager: For the last month I have, again, been completing complex grant applications with three submitted and one ongoing and one successful!

I am also undertaking the final vouching for the Museum project which is, to say the least, onerous.

On top of this work, I am beginning to pull together a costed Business Plan for operations towards the end of the year. Planning of any sort is speculative but we must be ready when the time comes to operate once more. One fairly safe assumption is that static events at Whitehead will lead the way in the first instance, followed by a programme for mainline events. It is also likely that we will be coping with reduced capacity for some time to comply with social distancing. This will mean reconfiguration of carriage seating options and assessment of pricing to ensure that we are making adequate money to fulfil income expectations.

As all but essential works have ceased on site in

Whitehead, we are also having a forensic look at workshop space and how best to maximise use based on maintenance and restoration requirements. Hopefully this will enable better and more efficient use of facilities and targeted effort to complete priority jobs.

The Events Committee has been busy exploring ways in which we can use online means to generate some income and provide a little non-railway entertainment, the inaugural quiz on 19th February being one such event.

BELFAST MEETINGS

10th February: This was Joe Cassells' talk "Steam's Last Great Challenge" about the stone trains which operated between Magheramorne and Belfast between 1966 and 1970.

Drawing on material recently discovered by member Phillip Newell in the papers of his grandfather Henry Beaumont, Joe found that the scheme had been first mooted as far back as 1962 when various Northern Ireland Government ministries wanted to bring spoil from the quarry at Magheramorne to the foreshore of Belfast Lough to make the foundations of what is now the M2 motorway. Joe told us that right from the start, and somewhat surprisingly, the UTA was very enthusiastic about the job being done by rail.

Fortunately, the UTA had spent considerable sums on loco overhaul in the preceding years, and 70 specially-built four-wheel wagons were obtained from Cravens of Sheffield.

Fortunately, the loco fleet held on - just - to get the job done and Joe brought us through to the last day of spoil trains on 2nd May 1970.

A busy meeting (156 participants) was closed just after 10:10pm.
